**Making posters**

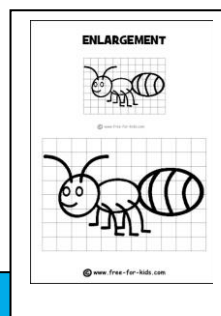
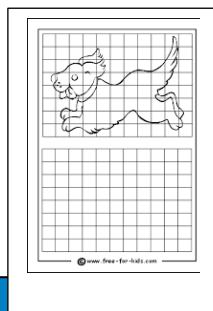
It's fun to make your own poster from a smaller picture! You do have to be quite patient for this activity though. Younger children will need a very simple picture (or you could make a dot to dot picture for them to do. Number the dots if you wish).

Find a picture you like and draw a grid over it with lines about 1.5cm apart. (If you can't draw on the picture because it's in a book, use baking paper and trace the picture and then mark the grid on it.)

On another sheet of paper draw a grid but with larger squares.....the larger your squares are, the bigger your picture will be! Use a pencil so you can rub the grid out later.

Copy the original picture using the grid to show you where to draw each line. Colour or paint your picture and hang your masterpiece somewhere to be proud of it!

If you are feeling really ambitious you can always try using a photo!



  
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
